The chord-scale system is a method of matching, from a list of possible chords, a list of possible scales. The system has been widely used since the 1970s and is "generally accepted in the jazz world today". However, the majority of older players used the chord tone/chord arpeggio method.

Chord-Scale Theory is an approach to improvising that relates chords to scales. A 13th chord can be related to a 7-note scale. To determine chord-scales, identify key centers and chord functions through Roman numeral analysis.; If a chord is a ii chord in a major key, the 2nd mode (Dorian) can be used to color that chord. When playing chord-scales, place chord tones on the downbeat to connect ...

CHOOSING CHORD SCALES In choosing a specific chord scale for a type of chord, it helps to narrow down the important differences between each scale in the specific chord category. For example, with a Major 7 chord, the difference between Ionian and Lyd-ian is a natural 4 versus a #4. With that in mind, here is a chart that takes into account those

The chord-scale approach is based on the idea that if a chord is diatonic to a scale, then that scale can be used as a source to derive melody on that chord. Using the chord-scale approach gives improvisers (especially less proficient ones) greater melodic and rhythmic mobility (i.e., they can improvise pitch sequences in eighth notes, triplets, sixteenth notes, etc.).

The approach of matching a scale to a chord is useful but should never be the main focus of understanding changes. The opposite or inverse approach is to see how chords fit into a single scale. For example, there are 7 7th chords that are build on the major scale and these can be used to create the "circle progression",

A scale is a horizontal representation of a particular collection of notes and is built up in 2nds; A chord is a vertical representation of that same collection of notes and is built in 3rds.

In music, an approach chord (also chromatic approach chord and dominant approach chord) is a chord one half-step higher or lower than the goal, especially in the context of turnarounds and cycle-of-fourths progressions, for example the two bar 50s progression: may be filled in with approach chords:

However, sometimes it's interesting to change "scale-to-chord-thinking" to a more horizontal approach. A good way of practicing this is playing over a backing track with a drone, note or chord that is continuously sounded. Playing with a drone leaves room for finding out how notes and harmonies work in constant chord harmony. That way you can concentrate on finding the best sounding tones or experiment with different colors or style elements within the chosen key.
