State laws should be reformed to prioritize less restrictive alternatives to full and plenary guardianship, including without limitation informal supports, supported decision-making, limited (and revocable) powers of attorney, health care proxies, trusts, and limited guardianships that are specifically tailored to the individual's capacities and needs.

Guardianship is not the only option. Supported Decision-Making is an alternative model, where people with disabilities keep their rights and their decision-making capacity. Instead of having a guardian make choices for them, people with disabilities have supporters who help them make their own choices. A person using supported decision-making appoints trusted advisors, such as friends, family, or professionals, to serve as supporters.

Supported Decision Making & the Problems of Guardianship ...

It is possible for an adult to have a general guardian or guardian of the person and still retain the authority to

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make health care decisions. A clerk of court may order a “limited guardianship,” which allows the clerk to allocate decision-making authority between the adult and the guardian. G.S. 35A-1212 (a).

Individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their parents, family members and guardians may have heard about Supported Decision-Making (SDM), an initiative that could affect their decision-making rights. Some see SDM as an alternative to guardianship, while others view it as an attempt to remove the legal instrument that provides a safety net for vulnerable individuals.

Supported Decision Making and Guardianship Termination ...

In the Court of Chancery, a Guardian is a person appointed by the Court to make medical and/or financial decisions for a disabled person. There are three types of guardianships: Guardianship of an adult person, guardianship of an adult person's property and guardianship of the property of a minor child who is under eighteen.

In general, there are four types of decisions: Autonomous – Leader makes the decision alone but may ask for information or consult with others beforehand. Consultative – Leader involves others in the decision-making process. People can weigh in with opinions and wield influence, but the final decision will be what the leader thinks is best.

Legal guardianship is both a responsibility and a privilege. What is Supported Decision-Making? The Supported Decision-Making movement is a new initiative that promotes the idea that, with almost no exceptions, all people with I/DD can make their own decisions with support from an informal network of advisors.

When making medical decisions for a person under guardianship, the guardian must first try to determine what the person would decide if they were able (substituted judgement). If this is not known, the guardian would then make a decision based on what is in the individual's best interest.

Court-appointed guardianship (or

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conservatorship) does have a role in protecting the property and decision making for older adults who are unable to make decisions themselves and do not have natural advocates such as a trusted family member with authority to make decisions.

Long-Term Care Planning: Guardianship - dummies

Once appointed by the court, a guardian is responsible for the physical care and custody of the child and for virtually all decision making, including health care, education, residence, social and other activities, and financial matters. A court order may limit the guardian's decision making authority.

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
